The President's Prize A New Trophy For The Club

In 2009 the curling stone handles which make-up the main feature of the 'President's Prize' - Trophy, were donated by Miss Mary Paton of Woodstock Road, Lanark.

She had no further details about the handles other than the information that was already engraved upon them. It is thought that R Barrie was the winning skip (were another 6 handles produced for the remaining members of the rink? Unfortunately the club's minutes of that year do not shed anymore light).

During the 2009 AGM, club members decided to have a new trophy created to supplement the prizes normally given by the President to the winning rink. As the handles formed part of the Presidents Prize of 1953 it was felt appropriate to in-corporate them into the new trophy.

Jack Hood was tasked with the job and the result of his labours is this splendid new trophy which appropriately enough was presented for the first time to Anne and her rink for winning the Presidents League 2009.

Using the handles to depict the 8' circle in the 'house' the trophy depicts a Centre Line Guard position - or is it?

to film what should have been a Grand Match for a series they were compiling about Scotland so we could have small screen stars in our midst.

However, the RCCC held the Indoor Grand Matches in October 2010 and one Lanark team went to Greenacres while the other team went to Perth.

Jack, Anne H, Jane and Anne MacRae made their way to Greenacres for a 10 am game. We were playing against the Orwell men (from Kinross) and we were 4-1 up as we stacked the brooms. Lanark was 5-2 up after End 6 but then lost a disastrous 5 at End 7. We could only gain one back at End 8 as the Orwell skip played a marvellous last stone which could not allow Lanark to gain any more than 1. Final score—6-7.

Martin, Moray, Alistair and Frank travelled to Perth and won their game 6-3 against Falkirk Ladies.

I know that other members eg Anne R and Lorna were playing for Lanark Ladies at Hamilton and Wilson was playing for Boswall at Kinross.

Despite it being an Indoor Grand Match the hospitality, the camaraderie and the good spirit of curling made it a thoroughly enjoyable time for all who took part. We do it all again in 5 years time...........



A Decade On!

It does not seem like 10 years since the Royal Club agreed to have a Grand Match, albeit, Indoors, to unite the Scottish curlers in celebrating the Millennium.

When the initial moves were made I had a feeling that should 500 curlers take part and play in 10 ice rinks, the day would be a success. The thrill of 2424 curlers taking to the ice in every ice rink for two sessions, some even had three sessions to provide ice for all the entrants, was much more than very rewarding. Even the Minister of Sport came along and joined the outdoor game played in Princes Street Gardens.

The day was a success, so much so that when the proposal was made at the AGM to hold the Indoor Grand Match every five years, there was no debate, it was passed unanimously.

What I will remember particularly from that day were the side stories, the phone call to an old friend, George in St. Andrews and in asking where we had sent his club, 'Kelso' came back the answer, 'oh that's a long distance', 'no its doon tae the bridge, roond the bye-pass, doon tae yon pub, turn left an' yer there'. On the day, the good ladies from Edinburgh took their picnic basket on the early morning train to Pitlochry and when they enjoyed their breakfast, the champagne was an excellent vintage.

And so, five years on and back in the body o' the kirk, my own club, Dunfermline, had been asked to represent the North at Brora and in selecting their teams, I was chosen to have what is now in the pages of curling history, 'the Brora experience' and it was and it is a great pity that it is not being repeated.

The second Indoor Grand Match was another success thanks to Ian Turnbull, whose knowledge of the clubs was absolute and the work of Bill Balfour and yourselves – it worked again!

The key factor however, in all of this is YOU... YOU made it work, enjoy today, good luck and good curling.




