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The RCCC is instigating a campaign tto raise
funds for the Charles Lees painting. The painting

ing of the Grand Match in Linlithgow Loch on 25
Jan 1848, that is 107 years to the day before I
was born! The painting was purchased by RCCC
in 1898 and is the Club's largest, measuring 8' x 5'

Time has taken its toll, however, such that both canvas and the frame are in urgent need of restoration. The latest estimate puts the cost at £50,000 to have the painting fully restored and

ready for display. The restoration project will be separated into two parts, the canvas and the frame, with priority being given to the canvas as the first area to be tackled.

There is a request from the National Portrait Gallery that the painting hangs at a major Exhibition featuring Scottish sporting heritage in November 2011, to mark the re-opening of the Gallery after its refurbishment. The Lees curling painting would form the centrepiece alongside Lees' other famous painting, "The Golfers". It is at least arguable that the sports of golf and curling are two of the most important things that Scotland has given to the world. I think it would be wonderful and most appropriate if indeed the Exhibition could be organised as planned.

In short, the RCCC is appealing to its members that we have a duty to the sport and the nation to improve the life expectancy of this painting by having it professionally restored and preserved. The campaign is to be led by a cross section of RCCC members, including Area Standing Committee and Ladies Standing Committee representatives, Board members and the Executive. The opportunity to donate is to be organised via the RCCC Charitable Trust, and that the Royal Club may claim back the tax paid element, increasing the worth of donation by 28%.

The Royal Club is determined that this restoration project is the best course of action to be followed to save the painting for the nation and have it available to be enjoyed by all. Hopefully the project will be well supported by members , as owners. The cause is a deserving one!

We did eventually find it, and spoke to a very patient man who actually seemed quite interested in tales of the bombing in Liverpool, no petrol and rationing. Soon, we were off again to Janet's house. Her 'children' had managed to secretly cook, and freeze, enough food for twenty people for the evening before her birthday. Of course when we all arrived and the food was produced, as if by magic, Janet thought that was surprise enough! We left after an emotional evening of great fun, apparently to return to the frozen north, as we knew that she and Steve were going out for a posh, birthday lunch the next day.

In fact we went to the B&B and Mary and Andy went back to the local Cotswold campsite. Next morning, as we made our way to Broadway, I noticed that every road we took had accident black spots on the road signs. Apparently it's not the narrow, winding roads that are the problem, but the motorcyclists! As Janet arrived, she realised that not only were we still there, but fifty more of her friends just happened to be there too! What a surprise! During the whole event, all the photos appeared as life-sized images on the dining room wall...

NEW MEMBERS REQUIRED

Lanark CC, this season, has 6 rinks playing in the club's fixtures and I think all members are worried that this decline does not continue. So,a plea to all members—please encourage new members to our friendly club. Our survival will depend on it!

At the AGM Martin Yuill informed members of his idea to encourage younger members to curling. His plan was to approach Lanark Grammar to inform youngsters of curling and to provide training opportunities for them. The younger people would then play against some of the Lanark teams in friendly games so that their involvement in curling was on and off the ice! Martin approached the Development Officer not only to inform him of this development but to gain his advice/support also. At a Committee Meeting in May the following action was decided:

- Anne Hood would assist Martin by contacting Lanark Grammar to seek a meeting with the Depute Head of Senior School. This meeting was held in June and both the Depute Head and Head of PE were keen to offer this opportunity to the senior pupils. It would not only offer another sport within the PE curriculum but it was a good school/community link. It was agreed that the pupils would be informed via a School Assembly in the new school year. However, Her Majesty's Inspectorate came to the school in October so our Assembly was delayed until after their departure.
- Anne and Martin were invited to Lanark Grammar on Wednesday 26 October where Martin gave a very professional and succinct introduction to curling. We had 2 female pupils immediately interested and the Head of PE will now seek names of interested pupils—we have been told to give her 2 weeks before this information is collated.



Martin's plan was to introduce the young people to lessons on etiquette, curling delivery (by using the indoor 'kurling' stones), rules of the game etc during their core PE time. This will be held, in school, either on Wednesday or Fridays. Anne and Martin are now currently attempting to 'borrow' the indoor 'kurling' stones and this looks very hopeful at time of printing.

The young people will pay £5 a game when they play on the ice—the remainder of the cost being subsidised by the Club hence why subs are being charged £2 a game during this season (as agreed at the AGM).

Transportation will be provided to the young people also.

This is the up-to-date news of this new development and I will keep members informed of further progress in future editions of Lanark Rocks.

However, on behalf of all members, a huge THANK YOU must go to Martin Yuill for the concept and his energy he has given to this initiative.

It is known that the young people may not be members immediately but unless we plant the seed then Lanark CC cannot hope to encourage youngsters to our curling ranks. This is most definitely a long-term plan and a worthwhile one.
